COURSE FORMAT: A one-credit course open to all UF students. It meets live only, from 8:00-5:00 p.m. on March 18th and 19th, 2022 at the Straughn Professional Development Center, University of Florida, Gainesville, FL (see address and map below). Guest speakers will present 45-minute lectures including some hands-on exercises in their area of expertise on various topics related to orchid biology and culture.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: At completion of this course, students will have gained an appreciation of the complexity of the orchid family, aspects of their biology and culture, commercial production, and orchid as a hobby.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The main objective of this course is to provide students with an overview of the orchid family and various aspects of their biology, physiology, and commercial production. Some of the specific topics covered are:

- Orchid history and classification

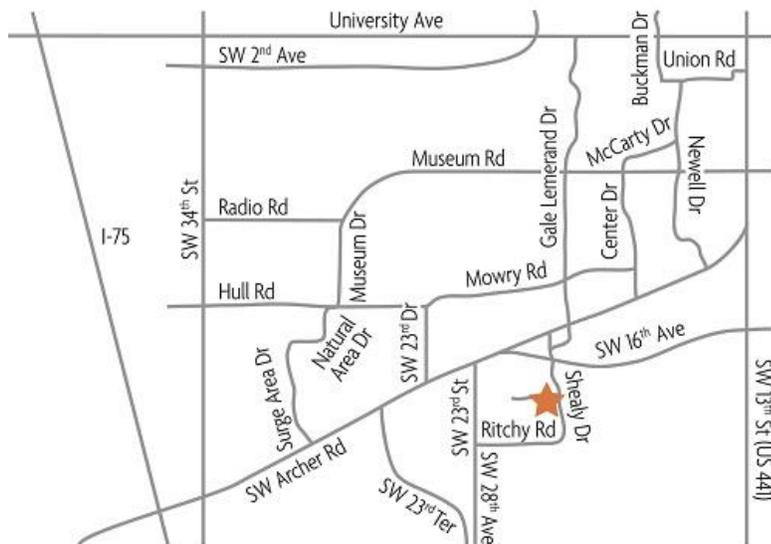
- Orchid production and propagation
- Orchid flowers and pollination
- Orchid pests and diseases
- Specific orchids of commercial interest

The course is delivered by guest lecturers with extensive experience in orchid biology and production, as well as a love for orchids.

IN CLASS RECORDING:
